Purpose of this MOU

- Establish a process to handle legal, law enforcement & regulatory requests in a *federation*
- *Why do we need a federation approach?*
 - *LLR agents may not come to the right place to begin with or know that GENI is a federation*
 - *Aggregates and other entities may not have enough information on their own to answer questions*
 - *We can be proactive as a federation to handle common problems that will occur*
- Not an agreement. New responsibilities established for only GENI LLR representative
 - Other responsibilities must be in agreements, such as the Aggregate Provider Agreement, to be binding

Motivation: Use Case Scenarios

- DMCA takedowns
- Legal defense leads to legal discovery process about a piece of software on someone's machine
 - Opt-in user complains that it wasn't me, but some GENI software
- Accidental download of contraband by experiment
 - Grabbed torrent with child porn
- Hacker or mischievous experimenter does something illegal
 - DoS attack?

GENI LLR Representative

- A facilitator to put the right people in contact
- Not an authority, but would report any serious issues to a GENI governance group
- Several responsibilities
 - Putting right people together, acting as a public face
 - Updating plans
 - Reporting on incidents
 - Gathering information needed to route requests and keeping it up-to-date

- Not a full plan for every kind of incident or request
- More a routing table or FAQ about what different parties should do with different kinds of requests
 - If X gets request type A, they refer someone to Y
- Aim to be flexible plan, and address the 90% case
 - Still need a human-in-the-loop, the LLR rep, because there will be odd or unexpected situations.

Recommendations on being proactive

- Want to nurture relationship with campuses; have good communication
 - A good way to get resources pulled offline is to cause the campus IT or Legal grief
 - They don't want a lot of DMCA takedowns for these machines that they host for free and know nothing about or who to contact
- Should have an email to put one in direct contact with slice owner (e.g., slice-xxx@geni.net)
- Helpful to register public IP addresses/blocks of GENI resources to speed up resolution
 - Might even be able to get a whitelist on DMCA bots
